A note from the minister

In a recent letter to ministers, UU president Rev. Peter Morales noted that we live in a time of historic cultural turmoil. Long-festering resentments are bursting out, posing immediate threats to the most marginalized in our society and presenting long-term danger to our natural environment.

Rev. Morales said he fears the new administration will unleash human rights abuses we haven't seen in a long time. He reminds us we are already seeing an increase in violent acts by people who see the election as validation for their discriminatory behavior. So religious institutions must prepare to serve in this time.

First, President Morales said, we must continue to provide sanctuary in the broadest sense of the term. We must continue offer safe places for reflection and healing. But we must also prepare to provide safe haven for immigrants, Muslims and others who will be at risk, and prepare to effectively resist the human rights violations that are bound to occur.

As always, President Morales said, the key will be for us to work together. Unitarian Universalists have done so in the past and as this new year begins, we will continue to do so.

Even though these somber reflections are not an ordinary New Year's greeting from a president of the UUA, I take heart in their courage and clarity. And I look forward to continuing to work with you as our congregation courageously continues to fulfill its purpose.

You may leave your donations in a box in the foyer or hand them directly to me.


