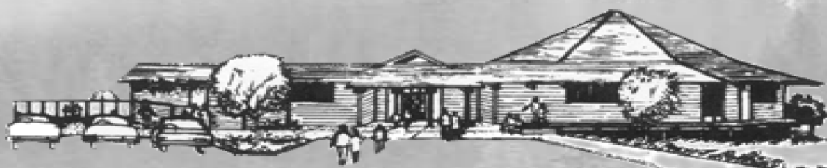

Board update

Current and incoming Board members gathered for our March meeting. JoAnna Welch started her term early as our new treasurer, and the Board is grateful for her spirit of engagement.

Following a study session on the budget for the following fiscal year, and review of the budget at our meeting with incoming Board members, the Board approved the proposed ‘bare-bones’ and ‘dream’ budgets for next year. The extent to which we can realize the ‘dream’ budget will depend on the outcome from the annual canvass. A big thanks to Dave Harris for his work on the budget and the continued leadership he provides in our fiscal work for the Fellowship.

We continued our discussion with Bryan on governance and ministry, and had the opportunity to work with real-life examples within the context of our meeting. We reviewed the Values, Mission and Ends statements that we have been reflecting upon for some time, and propose that they now be considered by the Ministerial Relations Committee and the congregation.

New Board members, and current Board members who will also serve next year—will attend the District Assembly in April. Bryan, Jillian and Shay will also attend. Our Fellowship will have a presence at this regional gathering.

Future Board meetings will be limited to two hours, with agendas planned to complete our business within that time frame. We expect this change will allow for more productive and satisfying meetings.

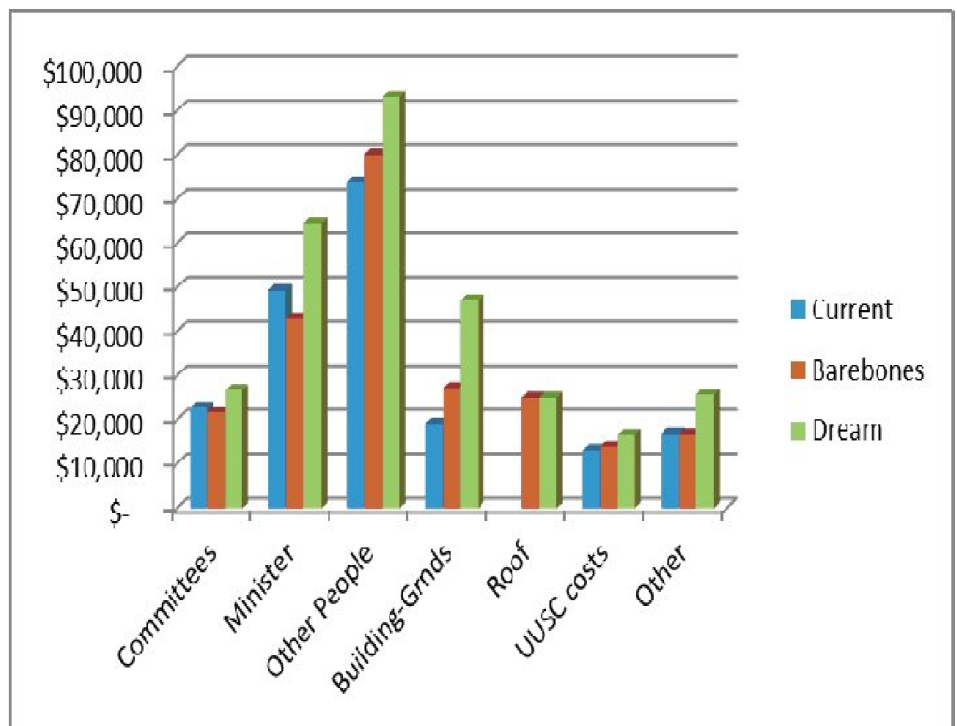

Barebones or dream budget— we decide

Mary Gleason in her 2011 analysis of our congregation urged us to be more transformational than transactional, but as transformational as I want to be I still can’t get past the fact that our annual HUUF budgeting process and the budget itself are soooooo transactional. But wait – the Board’s/ congregation’s proposed 2014-2015 dream budget (see chart below) is transformational in the sense that we dream of a three-quarter-time minister (who talks twice per month) AND a full time administrator the goal being to lighten the workload on committees and HUUF volunteers who have been struggling to find and keep chairs and members. Putting more money into HUUF to increase staff time, might help free up HUUF volunteer time so that we don’t have stay late to lock the door and clean up after an event and instead maybe have the energy to attend or organize an Adult RE event for example.

Our dream budget would replace the playground and do major upkeep/ maintenance work around the peace pole – both of these are transformational projects – projects where we’re putting money into our values such as a peaceful world and our children. On the transactional side, our proposed 2014-2015 barebones budget would fund a half-time minister and three-quarter-time administrator, both of whom work many more unpaid hours because of their commitment to HUUF. Our barebones budget would fund the replacement of the sanctuary roof; you can’t get more transactional than that. So, let’s all make this a transformational fund drive so that we can reach our dream for HUUF to be a thoughtful diverse community that supports people in their efforts to embody beauty, truth and love in their own lives and to promote peace, justice and harmony on earth.

José Quezada artist statement

I have lived in Humboldt for 42 years. Now retired, I have been a freelance photojournalist for the *Times-Standard* and the *Tri-City Weekly* for the last five years.

My photography is a simple aspiration to capture “sacred moments” of the Humboldt environment and its people. I am self-taught in photography, but the opportunity to shoot thousands of photographs of a beautiful place with beautiful people doing beautiful things has been the best photography teacher for me.

Dawn and early evening are favorite times for capturing images, as well as following the bay and ocean tides and their accompanying light for framing subjects. Fog is a frequent element in our lives here in Humboldt, and a frequent element in much of my work. I have a passion for learning and documenting the flora and fauna of our region in unique moments using untraditional perspectives. I will be learning how to photograph for the rest of my life.

Before photography entered my life, I helped start the first Head Start school in Humboldt County, worked five years as a resource and referral director for childcare, and worked over 25 years managing economic and workforce development contracts and staff for the County of Humboldt. Today my life is spent in classes singing and dancing with babies and their parents and lugging three cameras around for photojournalism and for my art. I consider myself to be one of the luckiest guys on Earth.

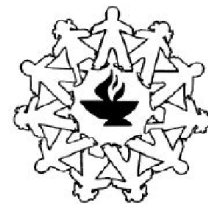

Council of Chairs to solicit counsel

There will be a Council of Chairs meeting on **April 16** at 5:30 p.m. at the Fellowship. Members of the Board and all committee chairs are invited. We'd love to have the committee chairs from the following committees attend along with anyone else from the Fellowship: Aesthetics, Building Use, Communications, Denominational Affairs, Endowment, Environmental Action, Finance, Fund Raising, Halloween, Hospitality, Information Technology, Library, Membership, Memorial Garden, Music, Newsletter, Nominating, Pastoral Care, Personnel, Planned Giving, Program and Worship, Religious Education – Adults, Religious Education – Children, Social Action, Stewardship, Volunteers.

Our biggest discussion topic will be to hear from Bryan and the Board on a new proposed governance structure the Board is considering which is designed to make decision making more efficient. We'll also discuss the 2013-2014 budget and our fund raising goal. The meeting must end by 7 p.m. as the choir will begin practice then.

Update on OWL

Last fall several of us tried to get the Our Whole Lives (OWL) program up and running. The *Our Whole Lives* lifespan series was developed by the UUA and the United Church Board for Homeland Ministry, United Church of Christ. Unlike many other sexuality curricula, this program is comprehensive and progressive. In an inclusive and developmentally appropriate manner, it addresses sensitive topics that are typically excluded. The goal of *OWL* is to create a positive and comprehensive lifespan educational program that helps participants gain the knowledge, values and skills to lead sexually healthy, responsible lives.

Unfortunately, we were unable to enroll enough young people to begin this spring, but are hopeful that we'll be able to get the program going in fall 2014. We hope to combine time and resources with several other local religious and community organizations. Over the next two months, I will talk with local ministers and community leaders in an attempt to convene a sort of OWL council that will support the program long into the future. The hope is that this council will then spend the summer educating adolescents and their parents about OWL and recruiting them into the Fall program.

This is still an exciting opportunity for HUUF and though we lost a little momentum over the winter, we're gearing back up to make a big push toward next fall. If you are interested in helping or know of youth who would like to participate, please contact me in the office.

Family seder

Sign up for the family seder which will be held on Friday, **April 18**, starting at 6 p.m. at the Fellowship. (email momof2turtles@gmail.com or minister@huuf.org).

From the Jewish tradition, the seder is a special dinner that commemorates the escape of the Hebrew people from slavery in Egypt. Bring a potluck dish to share: Please no pork or shellfish or bread or anything with yeast. Mark your dish either dairy or meat or fish, or vegetable accordingly. Some ideas for food include potato dishes, vegetables, brisket, chicken, green salads. Dessert ideas include macaroons, fruit or fruit salad.

Seder is a Jewish word for dinner party. No, really it is a dinner party with ritual. We have come to associate the word seder with the holiday Passover. And the seder for Passover is filled with much tradition and ritual. There is a specific order to the story that is told through prayer that is read from a Haggadah. And as with many Jewish celebrations food and wine is a big part of the event. There is matzoh, parsley, chicken soup with matzoh balls and more. Some believe that the last supper was a Passover Seder.
