Rev. Anthony Johnson and his wife Lydia Johnson will be moving to Arcata in late July and will join us at the Fellowship retreat **August 2-4**. Rev. Johnson will participate in the Gathering of the Waters service on **September 8** and lead his first service on **September 15** at the Fellowship.

Because we have a couple of months before we can get to know Anthony it is understandable if we are a bit anxious and eager to know what our Fellowship lives will be like with this new person. This article is meant to help while we live through this period of the unknown.

I recommend you explore Anthony's own website, an-johnson.com, where you can see pictures, read his resumes, watch videos of him giving workshops and sermons, and view some testimonials of UU dignitaries singing his praise. It will give you the best understanding of him until you can meet him yourself. Here are some highlights:

Rev. Johnson currently serves as Director for Congregational Life at the UU Congregation of Phoenix, Arizona after completing his internship at the Sedona UU Fellowship, and Pastoral Clinical Education at Banner Desert Medical Center, the sixth busiest trauma center in the country. He holds a Master's of Divinity Degree from Starr King as well as a Master's Degree in Human Learning and Development from Governors State University in Chicago.

Anthony is an Elder, an African-American cisgender heterosexual male who uses the gender pronouns he/him/his. He is married to Lydia Munoz Johnson and together they parent four children and five grandchildren. He is the eldest of four children and was born a Baptist in the South and raised as a Muslim in the North, never accepting either. He became a Unitarian Universalist in 2012. He is a former United States Army Officer. He has over 20 years in creative media production and executive management experience. He has been active in social justice activities since the late 1960's and is currently active in Black Lives UU, DRUMM, UUMA, and Finding Our Way Home.

Anthony loves music, practices and shares Tai Chi, enjoys playing word games and is a Master Poet. He loves travel, has been to forty of the fifty states and has served as a mentor to child-soldiers in war-torn Liberia, West Africa.

Bryan and Edie join the Search Committee and Board of Trustees in encouraging you to turn your anxieties into curiosity and to join us in gratitude for the ministry Anthony will bring.

A new Soul Matters Reflection Circle spiritual development program cycle begins in September. Please consider joining a Soul Matters Circle and/or being a Reflection Circle facilitator.

This year the Soul Matters Spiritual Development Program is run by our community UU minister, Jamal Tharp. Each year the Soul Matters Reflection Circle participants cross-pollinate. We form new circles with new members. This allows us to grow our friendships and connections with our HUUF community. The Soul Matters program is a project involving over 300 Unitarian Universalist congregations and ministers collaborating in the creation of worship, religious exploration and reflection circle resources. HUUF is using the Soul Matters themes found in our Soul Matters resource packets.

Monthly, we gather for intellectual stimulation, sharing and caring with each other. Our reflection time is 90 minutes. We utilize a theme-based resource packet for personal reflection that we receive a couple weeks prior to meeting. We are encouraged to review the packet and to try out one of the suggested spiritual exercises prior to our circle meeting. In our circles, we co-create plentiful opportunities to explore themes like balance, emergence and creativity, for example, out loud with friends. Each group has a facilitator or co-facilitators. Facilitator support and training is available.

Typically, reflection circles meet in a home. Many circles meet for only the 90-minute reflection time while other circles meet for a potluck meal, socializing time and the 90-minute reflection circle time. Some circles bring the whole family to our gatherings and we co-creatively come up with ways to support all ages of our beloved community during our time together. Our gathering is not work, it's play. It is our co-creative endeavor. Soul Matters gatherings are fun and meaningful for all ages. If you have friends that are interested in Soul Matters, please invite them to join you. This year, Soul Matters facilitators will be offered developmental support by Rev. Jamal Tharp.

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Multicultural Transformation Day

On **September 21**, Rev. Dr. Jonipher Kupono Kwong, Regional Staff for the UUA, will facilitate a daylong interactive workshop at HUUF, grounded in our Principles and progressive theology. We will spend the morning reviewing the "Intercultural Development Continuum" and going over results for the Intercultural Development Inventory. In the afternoon, we will role-play what microaggression could look like in a congregation and come up with examples and strategies for transforming white supremacy culture into a diverse evolving culture of love and justice. We will end the day with some concrete goals to implement a plan for a more racially just congregation. In doing this work we will engage in the process of multicultural transformation within our Fellowship, our faith tradition and in the wider community as well.

In a polarized society where differences divide rather than unite us, what is a faithful response to building Beloved Community? What does multicultural transformation mean and what might it look like? How can we foster inclusion and equity by both increasing our intercultural competency and practicing cultural humility? What tools can we use to dismantle white supremacy culture and curb microaggressions?
