A note from the minister

It's April. The name April comes from the Latin verb *aperire* which means "to open," and it refers to the opening of buds and leaves and flowers in the springtime. When springtime works inside us it also opens our hearts and we could use that kind of opening right about now. In the world around us so many things work to shut us down. I hardly need to mention the litany of worries that are brought to our attention by the daily news. Thich Nhat Hanh does not deny the challenges of life, but he does invite us to be open to a better form of news even amidst the troubles. He says:

"Our media does not focus on good news but there is a new edition of good news being published by the universe every moment and here's some of it: We are alive and the linden tree is still standing after our harsh winter. The sky is still blue. Children are still coming into the world and we still have arms to hold them. The dandelions are still sprouting up by sidewalks. If we bow our heads close to them we just might hear them singing. Their song reminds us to celebrate the beauty around us and to open our hearts to that beauty wherever we see it."

April means "to open," and it is a great time to remember to intentionally stop our fixation on bad news and to intentionally open to the little miracles that surround us every day. In a time much worse than ours Anne Frank said: "In spite of everything I still believe that people are really good at heart. I simply can't build up my hopes on a foundation consisting of confusion, misery, and death. I see the world gradually being turned into a wilderness, I hear the ever approaching thunder, which will destroy us too, I can feel the sufferings of millions and yet, if I look up into the heavens, I think that it will all come right, that this cruelty too will end, and that peace and tranquility will return again."

This April I am so grateful to be associated with you in this congregation as, together, we remain "open" to the good news of the universe and "open" to doing our best to expand its reality in our own lives and in the world around.

Let Earth Day inspire you

Earth Day. The name conjures images of tie-dyed, 1970-era hippies going back to the land, holding protest rallies and getting laws passed that stopped polluters in their tracks. No surprise, we're still working on those things, even without the tie dye. This Earth Day, April 22, the UU Ministry for the Earth (UUMFE), has put forth the theme of Justice for #EachGeneration, to express solidarity with the 21 young plaintiffs (ages 10 to 21) who are suing the federal government over the loss of their constitutional rights to life and happiness as climate change worsens, unaddressed. Another Earth Day organization, the Earth Day Network (http://earthday.org) focuses on the rising tide of plastics pollution. They point out that plastics manufacturing consumes 8% of the world's petroleum, and by 2050 plastic in the oceans will weigh as much as all the fish in the seas.





Andy Fisher talk

Andy Fisher, author of *Big Hunger: The Unholy Alliance Between Corporate America and Anti-Hunger Groups*, will speak on Friday, March 30, 4 p.m. at the Fellowship. This community event is sponsored by Locally Delicious, the Humboldt Food Policy Council, Food for People, and the Social Action Committee.

In *Big Hunger*, author Andrew Fisher argues that many key antihunger efforts are missing an essential element of the problem: economic inequality driven by low wages. His research finds that efforts to end hunger, reduce obesity, and reform farm subsidies are compromised by corporate interests. Encouragingly, *Big Hunger* sets forth a vision for what we can do to solve hunger.

2018-19 Budget Development

Our pledge drive and budget development are intertwined. We share responsibility for setting our goals, fulfilling our aspirations, and financing our activities. Now that the pledge drive is underway, we need your help in creating a balanced budget. Here's how that process works.

The Board of Trustees has already supplied the Finance Committee with its budget assumptions. These include (1) a pledge goal, (2) expectations about personnel and salary changes, and (3) an incremental target for the percentage of full-time wages for our minister.

The Finance Committee asked Committee Chairs and/or cost center managers to submit their budget requests for 2018-19 by mid-April.

The Finance Committee will assemble and submit a preliminary budget to the Board of Trustees in early May. After incorporating Board recommendations/adjustments, the Finance Committee will make the preliminary budget available to the Congregation for review and input by mid-May. Congregational input will be accepted until the end of May.

The Finance Committee will incorporate the final pledge total, along with any additional suggestions from the Board and the Congregation into a proposed balanced budget in early June. The Board will finalize and publish the proposed budget for Congregational adoption at a special Congregational Meeting before June 31, 2018.

As the fiscal year progresses, the Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees will regularly monitor the budgeted expenses and income compared to the actual expenses and income and make adjustments as required.

Rev. Rasuli has also taught classes including about the writings of Henry David Thoreau through his Center and is quite familiar with our Transcendentalist tradition. Last year, Rev. Rasuli spoke to us regarding black history.

Sunday, April 15 – 9 and 11 a.m. – Unitarian Universalism and Activism – Rev. Bryan Jessup

In this service we will explore the link between Unitarian Universalism and activism and ask why UUs might be called to be activists in many different ways and why activists might benefit from being part of UU communities. None of us can accomplish great social change alone, but it won't happen without us either.

Sunday, April 22 – 9 and 11 a.m. – For Our Children's Sake, We Can Be More Sustainable – John Schaefer and Joanna Welch

Facing frightening environmental prospects, we can take heart to see the progress we've made since the first Earth Day, and HUUF's solar electricity is one example. With that history, we can make the even greater changes we now know are necessary. In this service congregation members John and Joanna will describe and exemplify some sustainable changes. Watch for suggestions on car-pooling and biking.

Sunday, April 29 – 9 and 11 a.m. – An Interweaving of Traditions – Rabbi Naomi Steinberg

Rabbi Naomi will share her experience as a long-time practitioner of Siddha Yoga, a path of meditation and devotion. The program includes some of the Rabbi's original mystical tales, Hebrew chants, and brief meditation practice. This service is in memory of Swami Girijananda.
