## March musings on lambs, blossoms and celebration

The skunk cabbages in the creek along my regular running route are unfolding and buds are swelling on many deciduous trees, camellias and the early raspberry-hued rhododendrons.

## What's it cost?

What does it cost to keep our Fellowship open, active and engaged? The adopted 2011-12 budget itemizes our expenses at \$171,162. By comparison, in 2004-05, we spent \$126,829. In 1999-2000 we spent \$100,020. In 12 years our budget has increased by over 70%. Close inspection shows changes in the composition and distribution of our spending. While we substantially reduced costs of debt service, newsletter production and PG&E (due to installation of PV panels), other utilities have increased by an average of 238%; and we are investing far more in RE and music, and are now paying not only an administrator with greatly increased duties but also a half-time consulting minister. Also noteworthy is the 39% increase in denominational dues - we now send UUA/PCD a "fair share" of \$82 for each member.

To support hiring a part-time minister and continuing all of our programs, the Finance Committee and Board fashioned a 2011-12 budget that relies on close to \$30,000 in reserve funds (17% of the total). To sustain this initiative and move toward our goal of calling a minister in the near future, we need to increase our pledge dollars. We have mountains of data that tell the story of our financial history. The cost-comparison table below shows some of our history.

Over the years, each generation of members has challenged themselves to set high standards for the now and the future. We are no different. Because member pledges fund a large percentage of our operating budget (67% this year), a successful canvass and pledge drive is essential to our Fellowship.

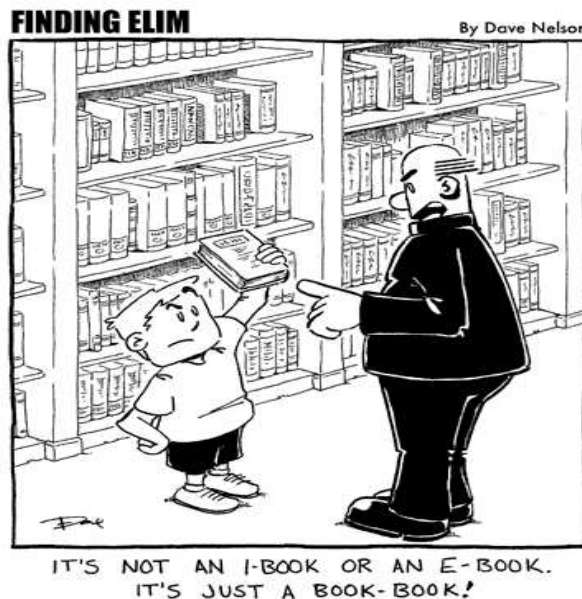
This will be an advanced workshop. Anyone who has taken his basic dream workshop or who has taken one of the many OLLI dream workshops may attend.

## Real dollars

Warning, the following article contains real dollar amounts of pledges.

Ever wonder whether the pledging at HUUF is similar to other UU congregations? Last year, Debby and I upped our pledge from \$1,500 to \$2,000 because Berti got up and urged us all to follow through with our pledge increases when Dennis came on as our minister. Our pledge is about 2% of our combined DINK (dual income, no kids) income. That pales compared to the amount Christians pledge, which is in the range of 8-10% of their incomes. On the other hand, I suspect that evangelicals, and other Christians probably don't give money to a lot of other causes. I checked our tax return for last year, and while we donated \$2,000 to HUUF, our total donations last year were around \$8,000, putting us in league with evangelicals – who'd have thought?

UUA does not publish the amount pledged per congregation, instead, it publishes information about the number of members and the expenditures that each congregation makes. Last year, HUUF expended about \$1,000/member (\$132,000 in expenses with 127 members). California had 71 UU congregations in 2010 with 12,400 members who expended about \$1,750/member. That includes Sunnyvale, which expended \$2,600 per member and San Rafael, which expended \$1,822 per person. But when you look at various congregations throughout the state, along the west coast and world wide (see chart below), HUUF expenditures are on the low side per member.

Debby and I hope that we as a congregation increase our pledging because we want to see the good that comes from having enough income to do all of the things that we all jointly want to see happen with our congregation. Debby and I are going to increase our pledge again this year because we want to continue having a minister and to do more in these economic, socially and morally challenging times.
