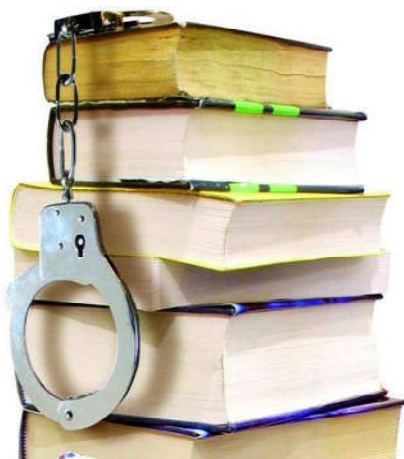

Katherine Almy is glad to have husband **Richard Taylor** recovering at home after a stint in the hospital fighting a scary infection.

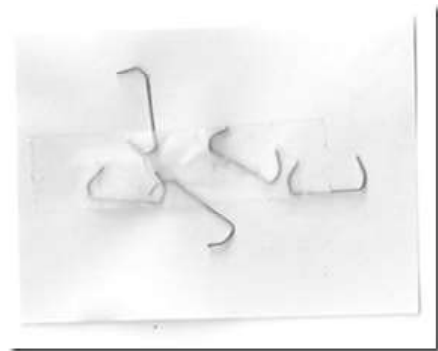

Please be aware that if small metallic objects like staples or paper clips are dropped into the inside of the piano they can create mechanical problems with the action or undesirable noises with the strings and soundboard. When the cover is off the piano and the lid is open, please be extra vigilant to avoid activities which may cause debris or liquids to end up inside.

Board minutes

The February 9 Board meeting received updates on job descriptions for Board positions that are being written for the Nominating Committee. Three positions on next year's Board of Trustees are being recruited: co-president, secretary and trustee. The Congregational Annual Meeting between services on March 6 will present the new slate for election.

The donor-funded foyer expansion project contractor was announced as Mathew Poston. He will lift the deck to allow for archaeological artifact research prior to construction. A final Memorandum of Understanding and construction schedule are still in flux. An ADA improvement elsewhere on the property is a requirement for the construction. The Board agreed this cost is appropriately borne by the congregation and is seeking the approximate \$5,000 through fundraising.

Resurfacing of our driveway and parking lot as well as the potential redesign of our entrance onto Jacoby Creek Road were discussed, as an extension of a discussion at the previous Operations Teams meeting. Permeable surfaces will be researched, as well as our code limitations.

Some scholarship funds to attend the April 22-24 UU Pacific Central District Conference in Fremont will be available to interested attendees.

The HUUF Administrator was acknowledged for her performance and granted a pay raise to \$17.62/hour retroactive to July, 2015 with two Board members standing back from the decision.

Newsletter timeline

I received a submission last month mid-morning of the day after the deadline. Let me describe my work schedule so you'll understand why I can't accept articles after the deadline.

Five days before the deadline, I send an email reminder to frequent submitters. A few days before the deadline I begin answering email to confirm I received them and start editing the submissions. For articles that have a general placement in the newsletter (e.g. the minister's note) I place early articles in their final positions. On the deadline day I start placing the articles already submitted and editing the late arrivals. Within two to four hours of the deadline, I've finished placement, added graphics, printed a proof copy and reread everything to check for errors. Then it's sent to my proof-reader (and the month error in February was mine, not hers). As soon as her corrections are incorporated, it's sent to the printer, generally by early to mid-morning of the day after the deadline but sometimes by the evening of the deadline date. At that point, the newsletter is irretrievable. The ladies at Central Office often have the newsletter in the post office by late afternoon. They mail it. So, no, I can't take late submissions or add inserts.

Foyer construction project

Construction to enlarge the foyer is set to begin on **February 23**. The project, funded by a very generous donation from Debi Cooper, will enlarge the existing area to approximately the first step of the deck outside. Construction entails tearing up a small section of deck, digging a footing under the watchful oversight of our archaeological consultant and tribal monitors, building a stem wall and then constructing the new outer wall. The current inner walls of the foyer will remain standing until the new extension is completely weather tight, and then be removed.

An unexpected permit requirement means HUUF has to spend 20% above the original construction cost to improve disabled access. The current plan is to construct another paved single-vehicle parking space in the parking area immediately outside of the teen room and build a sidewalk to connect the new parking spot to the existing sidewalk in front of the CARE building. Because this was not part of Debi's very generous donation, HUUF is asking members and the community for earmarked donations ("foyer project" in memo line) to help cover the approximate \$5,000 cost, which is an improvement to the grounds and buildings. Already, two HUUF members have stepped forward with generous donations.
