Many of you will be familiar with the practice of Lectio Divina. From the Catholic tradition, it asks us to spend time meditating upon sacred words. For some of us, this will be a verse from a trusted religious source. For others, it may be calling to mind the contemplations of a beloved teacher, activist or prolific thinker. For many of us, who find medicine inside language, it may simply be the act of re-reading (or reciting from heart, as some of these words have become so essential to our journey, we've allowed them to take up permanent residence inside our consciousness) a favorite poem or recalling a cherished song.

In the Judeo-Christian texts, the Psalmist writes, "I have hidden your word in my heart." For us Unitarian Universalists, those holy words may vary greatly. Our wise ones and prophets may not fit the traditional mold, but their words speak directly to our hearts. At times like these, when words are being weaponized across the political and ideological strata, it is important to remember that these same words can be used as a balm, a force for healing and reclamation, too.

As you journey through the month to come, beloveds, we invite you to surround yourself with wisdom. Seek out wise company, wise counsel, wise media, wise books and articles and entertainment. Wise memes and tweets and soundbites and conversation. Pay attention to how you feel when you encounter the words around you. Does it add to your sense of peace, agency, beauty, and holy empowerment in this world? Or does it feed into the parts of you that feel fearful, disenfranchised and at war?


Here are a few of ours:

Board Report

Birthday cake and hopes for peace

Our meeting on Tuesday, February 13, was attended by all HUUF Board members and Director of Spiritual Life Amy Day. HUUF member Josh Charles also attended (despite this being his birthday) to see if the meeting was interesting enough to merit his joining the Board. We ate birthday cake and pie, and he was still present at the end of the meeting.

Laura Phelan-Shahin spoke to us on behalf of the Redwood Peace and Justice Coalition. They are seeking endorsements from spiritual groups in our local area for their resolution for a ceasefire in Palestine. They are asking the City of Arcata to adopt the resolution, already adopted by a score of major cities across the country. Palestinian families have been forced to move into a concentrated area of the Gaza Strip, deprived of water, food, adequate shelter and medications, and bombed by the American-supported Israeli military forces. After hearing her presentation, the Board endorsed the ceasefire resolution with consensus. Laura asks that we attend upcoming Arcata City Council meetings (first and third Wednesdays of the month at 6:00 p.m.) to speak in support of a ceasefire, and that we sign the resolution they are circulating.

The Board is preparing for the March 24 Congregational Meeting, to begin at 12:30 pm, at which we will discuss instituting all-gender restrooms and will elect the newest slate of Board members.

Our amazing Director of Congregational Operations, Bridgette Garuti, helped me compose a fund raising effort on the UUA platform *Faithify*, on which we hope to raise \$10,000 in support of Rev. Tom Lewis' California Careforce free vision and dental clinic. Please save time on July 12 or 13, between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., to help staff this humanitarian project, a great chance to put our UU principles into action.

The HUUF Pledge Drive is fast approaching. More on that next month.

Our next Board meeting will be on March 12, 7:00 p.m., in-person in the HUUF Sanctuary. The first 30 minutes are provided for members to share their ideas or concerns with the Board.

Such a conscience can no longer turn away, no longer choke back what must be said: this immoral war must stop.




Climate Action Campaign

Things we can do, from the legislature to our daily bread

CAC members John Schaefer and Sue Lee Mossman recently met with staff of State Senator Mike McGuire's office to seek their advice on how to get effective climate bills introduced in the State Senate and ask the senator to introduce carbon pricing legislation. Our request was based on the En-Roads computer model that shows that a higher carbon price is THE critical strategy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions quickly enough to mitigate the climate crisis. We are in the process of completing a legislative proposal form to go to Sen. McGuire's Energy and Climate Related Policy team. They will determine if the requested legislation can be forwarded to the Senate Democratic Caucus, which decides legislative priorities.

We appreciate Pat Carr's efforts to arrange a meeting with Assemblyman Jim Wood for climate related matters, but he was unsuccessful due to lack of staffing at Assemblyman Wood's Eureka office.

Dr. Wendy Ring will speak on the campaign to shutter Humboldt's local biomass electricity plant at HUUF's March 3 service. The plant is a major power source for our Redwood Coast Energy Authority, which supplies electricity to most of us, and Arcata holds a board position. Dr. Ring has asked Arcata residents to contact city council members about this, and I thank CAC members who have done so.



A reminder to EV drivers that CAC member Cena Marino has installed a JuiceBox charger at her home in Eureka. Cena welcomes HUUF members and friends to charge their vehicles free of charge; please call first to arrange a time.

Given the critical situation with plastic pollution, you may be interested in ways we can each help mitigate this crisis. When ordering take-out in Arcata, I bring my own container, and I get 25 cents off. (When they put my take-out or beverage in their containers, I'm charged an extra 25 cents.) When I recently ordered take-out from Tomo's in Arcata, I went there and placed my order, left my containers and ran errands for 30 minutes. When I returned, my order was ready in my own containers. But Tomo's will only do this for orders placed in person. The same can be done with take out from food trucks. When I buy day-old bread at Ramones, I bring my own plastic bread bag and ask for the bread to be transferred from their plastic bag to mine. They don't charge me the quarter for the plastic bag. At Eureka Natural Foods (ENF) in McKinleyville, I bring an empty egg carton for bulk eggs. At both the Arcata Co-op and ENF, I use empty yogurt containers to hold items I order from meat and seafood counters and for some items in the produce and bulk departments. Workers at ENF have expressed appreciation that I do this, and I get a few cents off at the register for each bag or container that I reuse (although I have to remind most of the cashiers).

When I buy sushi at the Arcata Co-op, I order directly from the counter and hand them my own container. But if I've forgotten to bring a container, they will put my order into a cardboard carton from the deli section if I ask. These are small actions on my part, but they would have more impact if each of us did this. Along with shopping bags, I always carry yogurt containers and used plastic bags in my car.

Thanks to each of you for the everyday acts you also do to protect our climate and Earth's life support systems.

HUUF Annual Meeting, March 24

HUUF's Annual Meeting will take place on Sunday, March 24, following the service. This is when the congregation traditionally elects new members to the Board of Trustees. Please see Sylvia Shaw's article in this newsletter for information on the nominees.

Two other issues are on the agenda. First, we'll discuss converting the two restrooms in the main building to all-gender. This is the first time the possibility will have been raised with the congregation. No consensus will be sought on a decision. This is an opportunity to air the idea and to speak and listen to each other

Second, at their February meeting, the Board of Trustees came to consensus and endorsed a petition authored by the Redwood Peace and Justice Center Coalition urging the City of Arcata to demand the U.S. Congress and President "take urgent action to enact an immediate ceasefire in the Gaza Strip." (See the proposed resolution below.) The Board can only speak for itself; it cannot speak for the congregation. Following discussion, consensus will be sought from the congregation to endorse this petition. The Unitarian Universalist Association came out strongly for a ceasefire in October 2023: https://www.uua.org/pressroom/press-releases/catastrophe-gaza-and-israel.

Refreshments will be served after the service. The Annual Meeting will begin around 12:30 p.m. Looking forward to seeing you there!

Redwood Peace & Justice Center Coalition Proposed Resolution, City of Arcata, on a Ceasefire in Palestine

WHEREAS, the City of Arcata has an important and longstanding history of supporting peace and diplomatic solutions to international conflicts, and

WHEREAS, Dr Martin Luther King Jr. said, "It is not possible to be in favor of justice for some people and not be in favor of justice for all people," and

WHEREAS, time is of the essence to halt an unmitigated humanitarian disaster in Palestine, as expressed by the Director of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestinian Refugees in the Near East when he said, "Gaza is running out of life," and

WHEREAS, Israel's blocking of food, water, medicine and fuel into the Gaza Strip is causing suffering, starvation and disease that is leading to more deaths, and

WHEREAS, Israel's continued indiscriminate bombing and shooting of innocent civilians along with the displacement and destruction of the Palestinian homes and critical infrastructure is making Gaza uninhabitable, and WHEREAS, this atrocity is causing an expansion and escalation of regional war and could ultimately lead to a world war.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the City of Arcata formally demands Congress and the US President take urgent action to enact an immediate ceasefire in the Gaza strip.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Arcata calls for the unrestricted supply of food, water, fuel and medicine into the Gaza strip.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Arcata demands the US President to resume negotiations for the release of all hostages, both Israeli and Palestinian.
