Near and dear to my heart, for instance, is the need for a "set up and take down" Champion for Sunday services.

As the Board and I and current champions work together to recruit and train new champions this next year, you'll be hearing from us. We hope you will not fight your enthusiasm for the opportunity to help this Fellowship grow even stronger than it already is.

Third Annual All-fellowship Summer Retreat

Join us **August 3-5** for a mixture of stimulating workshops, fun crafts, inspiring worships, hikes, peaceful time relaxing by the river or under a tree, and great fellowship. There will be special Kid Zone activities, Teen programs, a No-Talent-Required Talent show, and Intergenerational happenings to enjoy at the beautiful Mattole Retreat Center (www.mattolecamp.com). In addition to cabins with bunk beds, there are spaces for tents and RVs at the same price. There is a swimming hole, volleyball court, and lots of green grass and shady trees. A large campfire area will be available for evening programs. The main lodge, with limited sleeping area, is handicap accessible.

All meals are included. We will do our own cooking to keep the price down. Everyone will be asked to pitch in with chores. The cost is: \$105 Adults (13 and up), \$80 Youth (6-12), \$60 Children (2-5), under 2 Free, with a \$300 maximum per family. Partial scholarships will be available.

Reservations are limited and will be accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis. I am delighted to focus on the challenging aspects of bringing our visions into the realm of daily life. Our reading in the Soul Matters packet highlights the significant influence of those we create with. This month our youth will have an opportunity to explore how essential compassionate communication is, in achieving our dreams.

Family Practice

Consider trying out as a whole family "Exercise A" from the Soul Matters Small Group packet. I suggest that each person first list their own life projects, including school, work, home and hobbies and then help each other see other things you each have created. This can be a great opportunity to celebrate and recognize gifts each person offers. After you've created your lists, look for areas of overlap. What have you created as a family? What would you like to create?

What is it that makes people and events worth remembering on Memorial Day? Is it just good deeds and kindness, or do we also learn from monumental mistakes and tragic miscalculation? Might past errors teach us something about repentance and forgiveness? Might recovery from errors teach us something about hope?

All Aboard the Great Redwood Trail

It’s not often these days that we hear good news coming from the halls of power. Fortunately, our State Senator Mike McGuire recently introduced a bill that would replace a crumbling rail line, that pollutes the beautiful Eel River, with a hiking trail.

There was a time when trains ran the length of the Eel River canyon and all the way north to Arcata, but those days are long past and while the trains haven’t run for years their tracks remain, though often falling into the river below, along with creosote and other toxic chemicals used along rail lines.

Senator McGuire’s bill, the Great Redwood Trail Act, or S.B.1029, would rehabilitate the rail bed and convert it to a trail running from Willits to our area. This would reduce pollution of the river while providing visitors access to redwood groves and isolated canyons along the Eel, which was recognized for its natural values when it was designated a Wild and Scenic River in 1972.

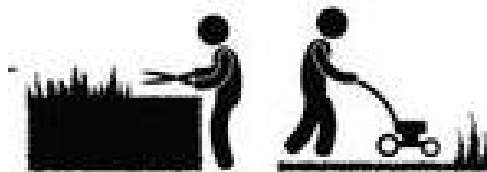
Linda Lee for removing large weeds throughout the meadow.
