Arizona SB1070

The UUA Board of Trustees has made a Resolution on Phoenix General Assembly 2012:

“Whereas the state of Arizona has recently enacted a law—SB 1070—that runs counter to our first principle, affirming the worth and dignity of every person,

Whereas the Association stands in solidarity with allies using a widespread economic boycott of Arizona as leverage for Love against this hateful legislation;

Be it resolved: we will not meet in a state of fear.

Accordingly, the Assembly hereby:

*Directs the UUA General Assembly Planning Committee to recommend to the Board of Trustees an alternate location for General Assembly 2012 at a location outside the state of Arizona;

* Pledges to generate from Member Congregations the amount sufficient to cancel arrangements in Phoenix for GA 2012;

* Pledges further to generate an equal or greater amount to fund ongoing efforts to Stand on the Side of Love in Arizona.

* Pledges to renew and redouble our efforts to become a multicultural, anti-racist Association; to live as a people standing faithfully in opposition to systemic racism in our congregations, local communities, and in our own lives.”

Council of Chairs meeting

A Council of Chairs meeting took place at the fellowship on Sunday, May 2, at 12:30. The following were in attendance:

The agenda included 1) Introductions, 2) Short description of committee goals and objectives for next year, 3) Comments on draft budget and 4) Suggestions for items for the board to consider next year at its retreat

Committee goals and objectives - Council members gave a short presentation on what their committees had done and what they planned to do in the coming year. Hospitality is intending to upgrade congregational social activities. Canvass needs additional members and a new chair for the canvass committee. RE committee is going well – however Jillian is looking for a new Teen director to replace the existing director who is joining the Peace Corps. Program and Worship is limping along with Steve and Katherine learning – Maureen is taking over for the summer. Program and Worship desperately needs facilitators.

Items for Board to Consider - Council members discussed items they want the board to consider at its June retreat. Items included the Membership Committee wanting to stay with two services due to space limitations. Building Use wants the board to consider whether they want to really ramp up building use for profit. Stewardship made a plea for a volunteer coordinator as the Saturday work parties have been sparsely attended. Steve Sottong made a plea for the Board to upgrade the sound system as the mikes are not working well, which is a frequent distraction during Sunday service. Membership pointed out building security issues.

The meeting adjourned at 1:50 p.m.

H2W2 Task Force making great progress

No, it's not a new form of water created by HUUF committee, it's the How To Who Too Task Force (H2W2); and it's making great progress on the board's request to have an implementation plan to address our four big questions: 1) whom do we get for a minister; 2) how do we increase volunteerism; 3) how to we improve our financial situation to do all of the things we want to do; and 4) how or do we grow? The board requested that the Task Force members (Bonnie MacGregor, Berti Welty, Lisa Roberts, Phyllis Helligas, Nick Appelmans, Danielle Stubblefield, Valerie Gizinski, and Carl Thomas) complete their draft plan in time for the board to review at its June 11-12 retreat. The task force first met on March 26 and has met three times since as a committee of the whole. H2W2 has also created three subcommittees to work on each aspect of the plan, one subcommittee each on ministry, finances and volunteerism. Stay tuned to find out at least one vision for moving forward through improving our financial resources in order to do all of the things we've said we want to do, including having a HUUF minister, increasing volunteerism and growing our fellowship.

Loleta project

At the end of April, Marianne Pennekamp, Ursula Osborne and Jack Munsee of the Social Action Committee met with Marina Cortez-Hash, Director of the Loleta Community Center; Gillian Sparrow, Director of the Loleta Food Pantry; and Tim Huffman, pastor of the Loleta Community Church to discuss how SAC can help those in need of assistance in Loleta. We discussed the following items as ways that members and friends of HUUF can help:

1. taking people to appointments, etc.
2. delivering food to the Food Pantry.
3. helping distribute food at the pantry Thursday each week.
4. providing shoes, socks and pants for children.
5. providing fruit and snacks for parents of the children who are served lunches. Parents may not eat the children's food. If they did, they would not be eligible for the federal program in which they are participating. Program runs June 21 through August.
6. tutoring at the school.

SAC will discuss how to implement actions to assist these efforts. When we know how we are going to proceed, we will contact people who completed the Loleta Questionnaire to help with programs in which they indicated interest.

SAC received two contributions totaling \$1100 for the Loleta Project. We voted by email to use \$300 for shoes, socks and pants for children who need them and have forwarded a check to the Loleta Community Center for that purpose.

Everyone is invited to the June SAC meeting after the **June 6** service in the room beyond the restrooms where more discussion of this project will take place.
