To the Beloved Community Renewal

"We say that flowers return every spring, but that is a lie. It is true that the world is renewed. It is also true that that renewal comes at a price, for even if the flower grows from an ancient vine, the flowers of spring are themselves new to the world, untried and untested.

The flower that wilted last year is gone. Petals once fallen are fallen forever. Flowers do not return in the spring, rather they are replaced. It is in this difference between returned and replaced that the price of renewal is paid. And as it is for spring flowers, so it is for us."

Once upon a time a woman, stepping into the corridor of mid-life, set

out to become a runner. Not to accomplish any fantastic feats or win awards, but simply to introduce the practice into her life. She signed up for races far enough into the future that it would give her something to strive for. For a meager fee she'd gain a measure of accountability to ensure a regular lacing of the shoes and set forth once more upon the trail. And there would be a t-shirt to boot!

Slowly she built the capacity to put one foot jauntily in front of the other, sometimes for hours on end. She crafted long and raucous playlists to accompany her on the roads. And then something would inevitably happen: the far-flung date

would arrive, the goal would be met, her feet would shuffle exhausted across the finish line, token t-shirt baptized in sweat. And she would put up her running shoes for a spell. "Just for a couple of weeks," she'd tell herself. For she knew that rest and regeneration were also imperative to reach one's goals. But then a fortnight would stretch into a solid month, maybe more. She'd lace up her shoes again and hazard a light jog down a familiar path, but ultimately the rhythm of regular movement would fall by the wayside.

One day, her tween-aged daughter turned to her and queried, "Mom, are you really a runner if you only do it for five or six months of the year?" So began a conversation that would continue within her as she looked at what it meant to claim that title, what it required of her, and what she might have to set aside to let this practice become a constant in her life.

May and June are the months when we are asked to renew our commitment to the Fellowship. A letter arrives in the mail, sharing the work we've sought to accomplish in the past year, asking you to evaluate what this community and our shared ministry means to you, and to renew your pledge

of support. At a base, transactional level, it's a call to help us keep the lights on for another year. At the level of transformation, which is ultimately what we strive for, it is an invitation to pause and


evaluate the places we pour our time, life force, attention, and resources into. We are called to still ourselves, breathe, maybe light a candle, gather in a moment of silence and look at the various ways we choose to spend this one precious life. Are our actions and stated values congruent? Or do we say one thing and do another? Do we purport to value spaciousness and ease and yet move through life at a breakneck pace due to all the activities and obligations we take on? Do we pay lip service to a life centered in love, and yet find ourselves bickering with those nearest us? Do we claim membership to a certain idea or organization, only to let our relationship to it lapse, a thing of memory rather than a living entity woven into our lives?

Renewal asks something of us: to once again turn toward that which we seek to create. To begin again and again, so the song bids us, "Come, come, whoever you are....Though you've broken your vows a thousand times, come, yet again: come." What is it you aspire to accomplish in this world, beloved? What is your heart longing

to create, and who are you including in your sacred circle to hold you steady and accountable to that dream? Renewal isn't something that happens once, a singular action or magic lever we pull to ferry us to the other side. It happens as a practice, a regular, embodied commitment that asks that we begin again, to come to the call of the moment alive, wholehearted, awake to the possibilities and challenges at hand.

Renewal asks that we turn once more toward the aspirations we hold for this life, and the people that can help us move steadfastly toward that goal, and ask what is required to bring that vision slowly, steadily, beautifully and imperfectly, to life.

Board Report

Our meeting on Tuesday, May 14 was attended by Pat McCutcheon, Margy Emerson, Montana Caouette, Chris Chapin, Corazon Amada, Josh Charles, Cynthia Chason, Chip Sharp, Bridgette Garuti, and Amy Day.

The Board is preparing for the Congregational Meeting on Sunday, June 2, 12:30 p.m. At that meeting we will:

- 1. Present next year's budget for adoption.
- 2. Approve Hart Mendenhall as the new Board Treasurer.

3. Discuss the proposal for an all-gender bathroom policy.

We seek to reach a consensus to approve all of these items. At the May 14 meeting, Cynthia and Chip took us on a deep dive into HUUF's budget, focusing on the Endowment grants, including their history and uses. We again discussed the proposed all-gender restroom policy. On May 24, several Board members hosted a HUUF Town Hall event, showing the movie *"Toilet Training,"* and exploring with participants their feelings and opinions regarding the proposal. This should help provide for a more informed Congregational Meeting on June 2.

HUUF raised funds on the UUA platform Faithify in support of Rev. Tom Lewis' California Careforce free vision and dental clinic. This brought in \$8,000, and now we urge Fellowship members to set aside time on July 12 or 13, between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., to support this humanitarian project. This will be a great opportunity to put our UU principles into action, and we expect it will be fun as well as inspiring.

Our next Board meeting is scheduled on Tuesday, June 11, at 7:00 p.m., in person in the HUUF Sanctuary. The first 30 minutes are provided for members to share their ideas and concerns with the Board.

Climate Action Campaign

Every month needs your earth-motherly love

While we honor motherhood every May, each month our Climate Action Campaign meeting begins with a land acknowledgment that includes a pledge to practice earth motherhood as have indigenous peoples since time immemorial.

How can people of all lineages develop spiritual practices compatible with their cultures to sustain them in the work to save our climate? As our dry northern California summer approaches, here are some ways we can nurture earth and be good parents to everything around us.

Thanks to Cena Marino and Margy Emerson for the initial ideas, here are some tips, well worth repeating, for conserving water this summer. A good general rule: use the least amount needed for the purpose. For example:

* Shower or tub-bathe economically;

* "If it's yellow, let it mellow";

* Leftover water or thin cooking liquid is good for watering plants, indoors or out;

* When using a clothes or dishwasher, wait until you have a full load;

* Replace water-guzzling non-native plants with natives that are drought resistant. Visit the California Native Plant Society office near Three Corners Market on Myrtle Ave. and support them by buying plants there.

* Does it take time for warm water to reach your faucet or shower head? Keep a bucket or dishpan handy and use that water on plants or to flush your toilet.

* Take a sponge bath instead of a shower when you can.

Instead of rinsing leafy greens under a faucet, I rinse them in pans of water, then re-use that water on thirsty plants. I have also used the hot water after boiling eggs to soak dirty pans, wash dishes, or for general household cleaning.

Last month, CAC co-sponsored a presentation by CalPoly Humboldt Professor Jen Marlow, who worked with the people of an Inupiat village on the Alaskan coast. These people organized a preemptive relocation to escape the rising sea. Professor Marlow also founded *44 Feet*, an organization working to safeguard Humboldt Bay's spent nuclear fuel site from our rising bay.

Among other activities, we continue to email and write letters to Assembly Member Tina McKinnor, chair of the Public Employees and Retirement Committee. We are urging her to support S.B. 252, the Fossil Fuel Divestment Act, and to allow the bill to move to the Assembly floor for a vote. If passed, S.B. 252 will require California public employee pension funds to divest from fossil fuel investments.

Thanks to everyone for your climate actions and your persistence to protect our earth mother's life support systems. Keep the faith, keep persisting, and be like the drop of water that erodes away the rock of climate change. *Sue Lee Mossman*
