


with office hours from noon to 4:00 p.m., or by appointment.

Join us to train in facilitating OWL groups

Every year or so, HUUF's Religious Exploration program offers Our Whole Lives (OWL), a lifespan sexuality education curriculum co-developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ. For the upcoming 2025-26 academic year, we hope to have six newly trained facilitators for this program, in order to offer OWL groups for fifth and sixth graders, seventh to ninth graders, tenth to twelth graders, and for adult sexuality education.



Our Whole Lives takes a holistic view of sexuality. It provides accurate, age-appropriate information while helping children and youth clarify their values, build interpersonal skills, and understand the spiritual, emotional, and social aspects of sexuality. In our congregation, children and youth meet in age-specific covenantal groups led by committed volunteers who undergo a comprehensive training weekend led by UUA-certified trainers. A sampling of topics includes: anatomy and physiology, gender identity and sexual orientation, communication, decision-making, sexual health, relationship-building, power and control, expressions of sexuality, and responsible behavior.

The Fellowship has budgeted funds to provide training for OWL group facilitators. What we ask in return for payment for your training is that you co-facilitate an upcoming OWL group for the age group you've trained for. All training takes place online and there are a variety of upcoming modules available to meet your schedule and needs, starting in September. Climate Action Campaign

This summer, act to save our climate

Even if President Trump pretends there's no climate crisis, we can still act to protect our future. Here are some simple ways to help do that this summer.

Donate to the Climate Action Book Project

HUUF's Climate Action Campaign and 350 Humboldt are seeking donations to buy books on the environment and climate-crisis for fifteen local elementary schools.

Electrify your Home

Federal tax credits for heat pumps and heat pump water heaters will almost certainly end on December 31. If you've been thinking about decarbonizing your home, now is the time to do it. Tax credits and rebates can cover the entire up-front cost for a heat pump water heater. Substituting heat pumps for energy hungry electric resistance furnaces and water heaters can save thousands of dollars over their lifetime.


Despite what you may have heard, most Humboldt residents can electrify with 100 amp service and without an expensive panel upgrade. Local climate activist, Wendy Ring, M.D., has been certified as an Electrification Coach by the national nonprofit Rewiring America. She offers free on-site coaching that includes:1) Using a thermal camera to identify heat leaks; 2) Calculating a home's heating load to determine heat pump needs; 3) Calculating available space on electrical panels and advising on low-amp versions and combinations of electrical appliances. RCEA does not provide these services. Text Wendy at (707) 845-2466 for a free consultation.

Join the local Sun Day celebration on September 21

Look for information later this summer as we prepare to join an international day of action, <u>Sun Day</u>, organized by <u>350.org</u> founder Bill McKibben. On the northern hemisphere's autumnal equinox, all the world is united in receiving roughly equal amounts of sunlight, showing how

the sun unites us. Sun Day will also occur just before the UN General Assembly's annual meeting, giving us an opportunity to send a message to global leaders on the urgent need to transition to clean energy.

CAC is joining 350 Humboldt to plan a local Sun Day event on Saturday, September 20. We plan to bring kids and grandkids to join the All Species Parade on the Arcata Plaza. We'll sing in celebration of clean, renewable energy that doesn't come from deep underground.



Write to your State Legislator

Write Assemblyman Chris Rogers and ask him to support AB 914. A sample letter follows for you to edit or add your own comments.

As your constituent, I urge you to support Assembly Bill 914 and maintain our state's leadership on clean air. As federal authorities roll back clean air rules, AB 914 offers a path to continue this leadership by reducing emissions from freight facilities. Thousands of diesel trucks arrive daily at California warehouses and ports, polluting communities across the state. Heavy-duty vehicles are responsible for more than half of fine particulate pollution from transportation, causing thousands of premature deaths annually.

AB 914 would require freight facilities to cut pollution through proven strategies like electric truck charging and solar power generation. Similar rules already work in Southern California and have tripled electric truck visits at warehouses.

While the feds attack California's authority, we must use every tool to protect our health and air quality. AB 914 preserves California's ability to lead on clean air solutions. Please vote for AB 914. Sincerely, (Your name and address)

Thanks to everyone who wrote to oppose SB 607 at our May Climate Action Sunday tabling. The bill proposed to cut the requirements for environmental review on nearly all development projects. These changes would have limited public oversight on harmful projects. Although the bill was passed out of committee in late May, it was amended to simply signal the Legislature's intent to change the environmental review process in the future. We don't know how that will turn out, but in the meantime we won a big victory with SB 607.

In gratitude to everyone for the different ways you help mitigate the climate crisis. May we stay in community with each other and find the courage to build bridges in a broken world, and the clarity to prepare our hearts for the path ahead.
