Rev. Joy Atkinson: A self-introduction

I am thrilled that I will be working with you on a one-third time basis this year, which means that I will come up to HUUF from the SF Bay Area once a month, on a Saturday, preach the next day, work full-time for the Fellowship during the following week, preach again on the following Sunday, and then return to my home in Berkeley early the next week. I will be available when in town to meet with the Board, committees, groups and individuals, conduct workshops, teach adult classes, make home and hospital visits—in short, to carry on a ministry to the congregation during this time of transition.

Some of you with long memories will remember that I served HUUF as an intern minister on a part-time basis 37-38 years ago from September to June, 1973-74. That June, I was ordained by HUUF in a joyful ceremony that still stands out in my memory as one of the highlights of my life. HUUF received me as a young intern from Starr King School for the Ministry, and then sent me forth as an ordained UU minister.

Since I left HUUF in 1974, I have served congregations in Duluth, Minnesota; Davis, California and San Mateo, California, as a settled minister, and then as an interim minister in six UU congrega-

Realities of peace vs. myths of war

Here are five essential realities about peace. The myths about war may be obvious.

1) Species evolved by adapting to their environment and finding a niche: "Survival of the fittest." Whatever technological and political achievements we enjoy were brought by co-operation within and between species, even between flora and fauna. Collaboration is even more significant in our biology than is competition.

2) A "just war" has long been an impossibility, certainly since the advent of aerial bombardment. It is impossible to justify the slaughter and suffering that modern war brings upon civilians. In wars of yore, 90% of casualties were soldiers; today, 90% of casualties are civilians. Jeanette Rankin wisely noted, "You can no more win a war than you can win an earthquake."

3) Conflict is not the same as war. War is a series of armed attacks organized with the intent of inflicting sufficient pain and terror that a nation or party can take control of land, markets, and people. Conflict is a healthy necessity of life. All but a small fraction of conflicts are managed and resolved peaceably.

4) There is always a non-violent alternative to war. Thank William Blake for the two-century-old observation, "War is a failure of the imagination." In the past century, we have many examples of bravery and creativity succeeding in the face of horrible brutality. Four of the better-known ones: Danes protecting Jewish citizens from Nazi occupiers; Gandhi and other satyagrahis achieving independence from Britain; civil-rights actions in the US; citizens bringing about the collapse of the USSR. These examples leave us no excuse for falling into the trap of war.

5) Inner peace will not be gained without due focus on right relationships with our neighbors, locally and internationally. Actions of co-operation and peace-making must come hand-in-hand, and heart-in-heart, with our efforts to develop inner peace.

It is possible to abolish war. Compare it to the campaign to abolish slavery. It took a few generations, but was successful in a relatively short time. Slavery was abolished when people of the world rejected the idea that slavery was part of human nature and demanded that government declare slavery illegal. Slavery is perpetrated today by outliers and criminals, but without the consent and support of nations. Similarly, war will be abolished when we reject the notion that war is a part of human nature and demand that governments absolutely forswear war and rely upon civilian, nonviolent defense. If not within my lifetime, certainly within the lifespans of our children, we can make a world without war.

tions in California and one in Tucson, Arizona. I look forward to serving you fruitfully during this transitional period, as you prepare to welcome a new permanent minister to HUUF in September of 2013. See you all very soon!
