To the beloved community The gift of dark days

In 1959, Pete Seeger penned a little ditty, with help from the Hebrew Old Testament, extolling the wisdom of the seasons. How there is a time for everything. You remember?

"...A time to be born, a time to die A time to plant, a time to reap A time to kill, a time to heal A time to laugh, a time to weep..."

Music does a funny thing to a psyche, though: how it makes a lyric itself indelible, forever inked into the terrain where language and melody reside in the mind, while the meaning can often be lost. Did Mr. Seeger do us a disservice by presenting these truths to us wrapped in such a peppy chord scheme? Would the message land a bit deeper had the words been handed to us in the more doleful sounds of a minor key?

In the Northern hemisphere, we're moving steadily into the dark. The vibrance and fecundity of Nature steadily receding into the Earth. A plant person would tell us that our more-than-human, leafy relations are not dying, rather that the energy is dropping back down into the root system, doing deep work underground in preparation for a glorious spring.

We're so very enamored of that spring. Too often we forget the necessity of loss that precedes it.

Recently, the Uyeki family held a beautiful Celebration of Life service for their beloved elders, parents and grandparents, Ed and Aiko, who left this world in the last year. We were treated to stories and pictures of a deep and abiding love that eclipsed the pain and ugliness of racism and internment they experienced. But the pain was not glossed over. Instead it was given a place at the table, so to speak. On the back of the program were printed the wise remembrances of Thich Nhat Hanh:

"The Five Remembrances

I am of the nature to grow old. There is no way to escape growing old. I am of the nature to have ill-health. There is no way to escape having illhealth.

I am of the nature to die. There is no way to escape death. All that is dear to me and everyone I love are of the nature to change. There is no way to escape being separated from them. I inherit the results of my actions of body, speech, and mind. My actions are the ground on which I stand."

Motivational author Steven R. Covey tells us that one of the things we need to remember in order to be effective in our labors is to "*Begin with the end in mind*." One wonders what would happen if we took that to its logical extreme? To clear a space for death, suffering, and loss to have a

Article II of the UUA's Bylaws serves as the foundation for all of the work of the UUA and its member congregations, of which HUUF is one. It is the covenant to which all UU congregations pledge themselves. At next year's General Assembly, delegates will have the chance to make changes to this draft with a 75% majority and/or vote on the draft as is. Next year's General Assembly is scheduled for June 20-23, and will be an all-virtual event. Stay tuned for more information.

place at the table. Death: not a far-off ephemeral figure to be shunned and avoided, but rather welcomed as a birthright, something that comes to us all regardless of age, status, or virtue.

To do this work of Life grants us the beautiful, agonizing knowledge that all of it is just on loan, and that every glorious and brutal thing we encounter will one day come to an end. Would it change how we show up in this liminal space if we knew that our actions were the only ground we had to stand on in the midst of the ever-shifting terrain of reality? If we knew in our bones it was not for us to determine what part of the song we fell into; how long the time of laughter or weeping or loss would endure? If all we knew was that we had to sing the piece of the song that came to us to play, and play it well, however mournful or jubilant the tone?

In slumber, our bodies repair themselves. In grief, our hearts are broken open to a new depth of tenderness. In the dark, great and mysterious things are taking root. And in the absence of light we are granted new ways to see. May we continue to hone and harness the gifts of this season. May we be awakened to the sacred resonance of the chords we play. And may we use whatever difficulty or heartbreak we encounter to continue to fuel our collective being, the work we are able to show up and do inside this one fleeting and precious world.

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Climate Action Campaign

CAC supports climate plan and funding local transit

HUUF's Climate Action Campaign has recently supported important local climate issues. You may have heard that our county Board of Supervisors have the opportunity to develop a bold Climate Action Plan that would be "qualified," meaning its goal is to reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions 40% below 1990 levels (a baseline year) by the year 2030. We've asked HUUF members and friends to contact the Board supporting this plan.

County supervisors are also considering asking voters to decide whether to increase local sales taxes to raise money for



road repairs. We and others think such a tax increase, if passed, should also support local public transit, an important way to cut Greenhouse Gas emissions. On both these matters we've had a table outside Sunday Services and asked HUUF members and friends to contact the Board.

Meanwhile, thanks to John Schaefer for taking the lead to arrange a meeting between CAC members and State Senator Mike McGuire before the end of the year. Our goal is to discuss the best path forward for climate legislation on the following issues: expanding California's cap and trade policy so it covers climate damages; legislation that would hold utilities responsible for leakage of methane, a potent Greenhouse Gas; and strategies for reversing the Public Utility Commission's (PUC's) recent ruling that cut incentives for solar panels on apartment buildings and similar structures. The agencies involved, the California Air Resources Board and the PUC, are in the pocket of the utilities and have shown no willingness to take strong oversight over the industries they are supposed to be regulating.

As we go to press, Pat Carr calls our attention to the not-good news from CNN that the world briefly smashed through the two-degree Celsius warming limit for the first time ever.
