April 10 – 9 and 11 a.m. Food and Community – Katherine Almy

“Do you ever wonder: What's the story of my food? Where did it come from, and how did it get to me? Food connects us to important questions of our time. The food choices we make – individually and as a society – create a ripple that is felt around the world.” This is the synopsis of the video “Nourish: Food and Community” that Katherine Almy will be sharing. It explores the ethical and political implications of the food choices we make and why these choices are much larger than simply what we like or even what is healthy for us. “As I generally eat three meals a day, plus snacks, I feel highly qualified to discuss this topic, as are we all,” Katherine says.

April 17 – 9 and 11 a.m. American Civil Religion & the Mythic Basis of Citizenship: Pitfalls and Promises - William Herbechtsmeier

Professor Herbechtsmeier examines nationalism in the framework of quasi religious elements with mythical underpinnings and looks at concepts such as patriotism, Christian nation, abortion, 1st Amendment rights, imperialism, sacred duty from this point of view. Where do these beliefs derive and how do they affect national policies, our ideas of government and nationhood, and the documents, holidays, and places we, as a nation, hold sacred. Professor Herbechtsmeier is a member of the HSU Religious Studies faculty.
