**Light/Shadow, Bridges/Towers: Spiritual Perspectives for Independent Thinkers in a World of Paradox—Dr. Jeremy Taylor**

Jeremy Taylor returns to discuss Carl Jung's views regarding the differences between immature religious and spiritual perspectives and mature ones on the basis of their attitudes and practices when confronted with irresolvable paradox.

Dr. Taylor, a UU minister, has worked with dreams for more than 35 years. He blends the values of spirituality with an active social conscience and a Jungian perspective. He is a founding member of the International Association for the Study of Dreams and the author of three books on dreams and mythology.
